TRIPLL Pilot Study Grants

The RFP for TRIPLL pilot studies was released on March 8, 2010 and proposals were due on April 23, 2010.

TRIPLL's pilot study program is designed to support translational research initiatives focusing on pain and pain management in later life. The application was open to researchers who are eligible to submit independent proposals from TRIPLL partner institutions Cornell-Ithaca, Columbia University, the Visiting Nurse Service of New York's Center for Home Care Policy and Research, Hospital for Special Surgery, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, and Weill Cornell Medical College. TRIPLL received 8 high quality proposals from researchers across the TRIPLL partner sites, with Columbia University investigators submitting 3 proposals and Weill Cornell Medical College investigators submitting 2 proposals. TRIPLL received 1 proposal each from Memorial Sloan Kettering, Cornell Ithaca and the Hospital for Special Surgery. The proposals address a wide range of pain and aging issues, including the connection between pain and frailty, alternative methods for managing pain, barriers associated with effective pain management, and pain-related resilience. Awards will be announced June 8, 2010.

TRIPLL Members Research the Impact of Environmental Volunteering on Older Adults

According to Cornell University reporter Ted Boscia, TRIPLL affiliates' work has shown that volunteer work in the environment has benefits for older adults in a number of health-related categories. The Cornell group's analysis demonstrated that older persons with environmental volunteer experiences had improved mental and physical health through old age and exercised more. The study was published online in The Gerontologist (Feb. 19).

The authors, including TRIPLL co-directors Cary Reid and Karl Pillemer, analyzed data collected between 1974-1994 from the Alameda County (Calif.) Study, an examination of health and mortality that followed nearly 7,000 adults since 1965. The study found that environmental stewardship is strongly linked to greater physical activity, better self-rated health and fewer symptoms of depression over a period of 20 years.

George Lewis, a Cornell University doctoral candidate and TRIPLL affiliate who presented earlier this year at the TRIPLL Work in Progress Seminar, and Dr. Cary Reid, TRIPLL Director were interviewed by the local New York City news station New York 1 on April 14th, 2010. George designed a mini portable ultra-sound device, and has been funded by the Center for Integration of Medicine and Innovative Technology to develop his project and test the proposal. George presented his proposal at the TRIPLL Work in Progress Seminar in January, where he received feedback on how test the device with seniors with pain problems. Reiki is a light touch manual therapy from Japan that supports the

whole person. For those with medical conditions, Reiki effectively addresses a variety of symptoms thereby improving quality of life. For others, Reiki can promote self awareness, inspire creativity, reduce stress, and create a sense of harmony and well-being.

In the Reiki Intermediate course, students are initiated through one attunement, are taught three symbols and their functions, and four treatment plans that incorporate the symbols. In hands-on practice sessions, students give and receive mini Reiki sessions with their peers. Homework is assigned to advance skills and confidence.

The Center for Demography of Health and Aging (CDHA) at the University of Wisconsin-Madison will award two to three pilot grants to investigators using the Wisconsin Longitudinal Study (WLS) data for scholarly research. The WLS provides an opportunity to study the life course, careers, retirement, intergenerational transfers and relationships, family functioning, physical and mental health and well-being, morbidity and mortality, and gene-environment interactions from late adolescence to the retirement years. Selected recipients will receive \$10,000 to support their research, along with a travel stipend to WLS training workshops. The training workshop will take place in Madison on August 5th and 6th, 2010, while the research workshop will be held one year later.

The FY10 NFRP encourages proposals that specifically address critical needs of the NF community in the following areas:

Complications of neurofibromatosis with high mortality such as neoplasms and cerebrovascular abnormalities; Complications of neurofibromatosis with high morbidity such as skeletal maladies, learning deficits, hormone-associated effects, and pain; Refinement and standardization of imaging techniques, molecular and cellular markers, and quality of life metrics for use in future clinical trials; Translational research such as the development or preclinical testing of therapeutic agents for the treatment of neurofibromatosis.

Investigator-initiated research, also known as unsolicited research, is research funded as a result of an investigator submitting a research grant application to NIH in an investigator's area of interest and competency. All investigator-initiated small grant applications described in this announcement will be assigned to NIH institutes and centers (ICs) according to standard Public Health Service referral guidelines and specific program interests. Program (R03)Program URL:http://grants.nih.gov/grants /guide/pa-files/PA-10-011.html Type of Scientists Funded: Junior Faculty, Administrator Program Description: The purpose of this funding opportunity announcement (FOA) for R03s is to encourage early career investigators or investigators who are striving to make a shift in their research to propose discrete, well-defined projects that can be completed within 2 years with limited resources. Projects of interest fall within the research domain of behavioral, combined, sequential, or integrated (behavioral/pharmacological) (1) drug abuse treatment interventions, including interventions for patients with comorbidities, in diverse settings; (2) interventions to prevent the acquisition or transmission of HIV infection among individuals in drug abuse treatment; (3) interventions to promote adherence to drug abuse treatment, HIV and addiction medications; and (4) interventions to treat chronic pain. Specific examples include: 1) Stage I pilot or feasibility studies; 2) secondary analysis of existing data; 3) small, self-contained research projects; 4) development of research assessments or methodology; and 5) development of new research technology.
