TRIPLL Pilot Study Grants

The RFP for TRIPLL pilot studies was released on March 8, 2010. TRIPLL's pilot study program is designed to support translational research initiatives focusing on pain and pain management in later life. The application is open to researchers who are eligible to submit independent proposals from one of the participating institutions to include Cornell-Ithaca, Columbia University, the Visiting Nurse Service of New York's Center for Home Care Policy and Research, Hospital for Special Surgery, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, and Weill Cornell Medical College.

Applications are due April 23, 2010 and awards will be announced June 8, 2010. Medical Student to Research Pain in Later Life

This summer, Dr. Cary Reid of Weill Cornell Medical College and Dr. Corinna Loeckenhoff of Cornell Ithaca will work with Alex Port, a Weill Cornell Medical College student, on research about pain and decision making. This TRIPLL funded pilot study will assess for age differences in the joint influence of emotional context and temporal discounting on pain management medical decisions, which she presented at the TRIPLL Work in Progress Seminar in November, 2009.

The student's work is supported by the Medical Student Training in Aging Research (MSTAR) Program, which is a summer medical school student research program administered by the American Federation for Aging Research (AFAR) and funded by The John A. Hartford Foundation, The MetLife Foundation, and The National Institute on Aging. The MSTAR Program provides medical students, early in their training, with an enriching experience in aging-related research and geriatrics, under the mentorship of top experts in the field. Students participate in an eight- to twelve-week structured research, clinical, and didactic program in geriatrics, appropriate to their level of training and interests. MSTAR students present their work at the Annual Meeting of the American Geriatrics Society in National Harbor, Maryland, May 11 - 14, 2011.

CDC Announces National Public Health Agenda for Osteoarthritis

Launched by the CDC and the Arthritis Foundation in February 2010, The National Public Health Agenda for Osteoarthritis (OA) is the first comprehensive national action plan that calls on health care providers, insurers, policy makers, public health agencies and the public to collectively take the steps necessary to reduce the burden of osteoarthritis which places severe limits on daily activity and quality of life for over 27 million Americans.

The overall goals for the next three to five years include:

- 1) Initiate needed research to better understand the burden of OA, its risk factors and effective strategies for intervention, including enhanced surveillance, exploration of early diagnosis and treatment, and the examination of emerging interventions.

- 2) Ensure the availability of evidence-based intervention strategies for all Americans with OA
- 3) Establish supportive policies, communication initiatives and alliances for the prevention and management of OA.

New National Campaign Launched to Fight Arthritis

National Awareness Campaign launched by the Arthritis Foundation, the Ad Council and the American College of Rheumatology aims to empower people with (or at risk for) Osteoarthritis (OA) to take simple steps to reduce pain, increase mobility and help prevent disability caused by OA. BLCC Innovative Research Program

Deadline: April 2, 2010

Research funding is available from the BLCC Innovative Research Program. Cornell faculty are eligible to receive small grants of up to \$10,000 in support of their research on life course related issues. The BLCC also offers grant preparation assistance to faculty members who are submitting grants through the center. Center funds (up to \$10,000) are available for faculty with an existing research proposal in hand or one already, or about to be, submitted to an external funding agency. The Innovative Research Project award can be used: (1) to support pilot/feasibility studies that render the larger proposal more competitive, (2) as a matching grant, or (3) as a means of beginning a proposed research program currently being evaluated by a government agency or private foundation.

Applications may be submitted by full-time university faculty and research associates across the university engaged in social science research (visiting scholars excluded). Multidisciplinary teams of investigators are especially encouraged to apply.

Department of Defense Neurofibromatosis Research Program

Funding Opportunities for Fiscal Year 2010

The Fiscal Year 2010 (FY10) Defense Appropriations Act provides \$13.75 million to the Department of Defense Neurofibromatosis Research Program (NFRP) to fund the best research to eradicate the clinical impact of neurofibromatosis (NF) and Schwannomatosis. This program is administered by the US Army Medical Research and Materiel Command through the Office of the Congressionally Directed Medical Research Programs (CDMRP).

The FY10 NFRP encourages proposals that specifically address critical needs of the NF community in the following areas:

Complications of neurofibromatosis with high mortality such as neoplasms and cerebrovascular abnormalities;

Complications of neurofibromatosis with high morbidity such as skeletal maladies, learning deficits, hormone-associated effects, and pain; Refinement and standardization of imaging techniques, molecular and cellular markers, and quality of life metrics for use in future clinical trials; Translational research such as the development or preclinical testing of therapeutic agents for the treatment of neurofibromatosis.

Department of Health and Human Services. National Institutes of Health Novel Tools for Investigating Brain-derived GPCRs in Mental Health Research (SBIR [R43/R44])

This funding opportunity announcement (FOA) encourages Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) grant applications from small-business concerns that propose to develop technologies and

approaches (i.e., novel ways to use new or existing technologies) that will enable researchers to study the structure and/or function of brain localized G-protein-coupled receptor proteins and/or potentially identify novel selective and specific agonists/antagonists to these receptor subtypes, with a focus on mental health function or dysfunction, including HIV-related neurocognitive disorders. Technologies and approaches aimed at known receptor subtypes or orphan receptors would be of potential interest to the National Institute of Mental Health. This FOA will utilize the SBIR (R43/R44) award mechanisms for Phase I, Phase II, and Fast-Track applications. Phase I awards normally may not exceed \$100,000 total for a period normally not to exceed 6 months. Phase II awards normally may not exceed \$750,000 total for a period normally not to exceed 2 years. For this funding opportunity, budgets up to \$350,000 total costs per year and time periods up to 2 years for Phase I may be requested. Budgets up to \$550,000 total costs per year and up to 3 years may be requested for Phase II. Deadline: 2010-04-05; 2010-08-05; 2010-12-05

Specific examples include: 1) Stage I pilot or feasibility studies; 2) secondary analysis of existing data; 3) small, self-contained research projects; 4) development of research assessments or methodology; and 5) development of new research technology.

TRIPLL is an NIH-funded Roybal center that focuses on translational research affecting pain in later life. TRIPLL is a joint project that includes investigators at Weill Cornell Medical College, Cornell Ithaca, The Hospital for Special Surgery, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center and Columbia University. Cary Reid is the Director of TRIPLL, and Co-directors include Karl Pillemer and Elaine Wethington. TRIPLL co-investigators include Thelma Mielenz (Columbia), Chris Murtaugh (VNSNY), Steve Passik (MSKCC), and Laura Robbins (HSS).
